

Proclamation

whereas, the defense and development of the Western Hemisphere and the peace and prosperity of its peoples depend in large measure upon cooperation and solidarity among the twenty-one independent Republics which lie within its boundaries; and

Thereas, inter-American cooperation and solidarity depend, in turn, upon mutual respect, confidence, understanding and good will among peoples who differ markedly in history, in racial origin, in language, in temperament, in customs and traditions, and even in the forms of democratic government they have adopted; and

Inhereus, the City of Troy is desirous of promoting, both within its borders and throughout the nation, that mutual respect, confidence, understanding and good will among the American Republics which are essential to peace, prosperity and progress in the Western Hemisphere,

Now, Therefore, I, Frank J. Hogan, Mayor of the City of Troy, New York, in the United States of America, do hereby proclaim and appoint the week of October fifth to twelfth in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-One as

Inter - American Week

and I do recommend that all the people of the City join with our distinguished guests from the Latin-American countries in the observance and celebration thereof.

And in order that this proclamation may reach, conveniently, the citizens of all the nations of the Western Hemisphere, I do direct that it be printed in the Spanish, Portuguese, French and English languages, and that an appropriate copy thereof be dispatched to the President of each of the twenty-one American Republics.

In Testimony Wherenf, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the City of Troy to be affixed.

Done at the City of Troy this first day of October in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-One.
